AABE NATIONAL NEWS:

Happy 30th Anniversary! Clarke Watson, founder of Denver based energy consulting firm, Watson Associates, called for a meeting of a core group of Blacks concerned about energy matters on July 25-26, 1977, at the Watergate Hotel in Washington, DC. Among those present at that meeting with Watson were J.J. Simmons (Amerada Hess); **Rufus** McKinney (Southern California Gas Co.); Robert Bates (Mobil Oil); Thomas Hart (Westinghouse); Larry Young (Maryland Legislature); Linda Taliaferro (Westinghouse); Mark Hyman (Public Relations Consultant); Lenneal Henderson (Howard University); Will Carter (Chevron); **T.J. White** (Phillips Petroleum); Wayne Smith (Colorado Public Service Co.); John Tucker (American Gas Association); and John Lewis, Editor and Publisher of "Black Affairs," a Washington bi-weekly newsletter.

Although there was no formal agenda, it was clear from the outset that Watson knew what he wanted the group to accomplish at this first meeting. He wanted to create a structure or mechanism by which Blacks, who had some knowledge and understanding of the U.S. energy situation, could bring their thinking to bear on energy policy-making. He wanted to call to the administration's attention that it could ill afford to ignore the need for Black participation in every aspect of the policy-making process. Another idea running through the meeting was to have the relatively new Democratic administration appoint Blacks to high-level, non-traditional roles in government. A consensus was reached fairly quickly to form a new organization, and that it would be called THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION

OF BLACKS IN ENERGY. with the acronym, **AABE**. AABE

was incorporated as a non-profit corporation in the state of Colorado on December 1, 1977.

Senate Passes Energy Bill

U.S. Senators passed new energy legislation on Thursday, June 21 by 65-27. The measure now awaits action by the House, which is expected to take it up next week; but attempts to combine the two bills and send legislation to President Bush probably won't be possible until later this year. Its supporters said it reflects a shift to new energy priorities, away from promoting fossil fuels to supporting other energy sources such as wind and biomass to make electricity and ethanol to power cars and trucks. The legislation provides a bonanza to farmers and the ethanol industry. It requires ethanol production to grow to at least 36 billion gallon a year by 2022, a sevenfold increase of the amount of ethanol processed last year.

The legislation also calls for:

Price gouging provisions that make it unlawful to charge an "unconscionably excessive" price for oil products including gasoline and give the federal government new authority to investigate oil industry market manipulation.

New appliance and lighting efficiency standards and a requirement that the federal government accelerate use of more efficient lighting in public buildings.

Grants, loan guarantees and other assistance to promote research into fuel efficient vehicles, including hybrids, advanced diesel and battery technologies, percent ethanol or biodiesel fuels.

The legislation for the first time would establish a single fuel economy standard applicable not only to cars, but also SUVs and pickups, which currently have to meet less stringent requirement.

NYC Blackout

For the 3rd time in the past five years, New York City experienced a power outage in the metropolitan area. A severe thunderstorm in late June coupled with several days above 90 degrees knocked out power in the Bronx and Manhattan for about an hour. A spokesman for Con Edison stated that the blackout affected 137,000 customers. NYC experienced a similar situation last year during the hottest days of the summer when it lost power to 174,000 customers. In 2003, the Northeast Blackout caused by First Energy in Ohio affected

several states, including New York, via the transmission system.

Top 100 Diverse Schools

Minority college student enrollment has increased by 52% in the past ten years. Diverse Issues in Higher Education magazine released their annual "Top 100 Undergraduate Degree *Producers*" issue highlighting well performing four-year institutions and how many ethnic students completed their degrees between 2005 & 2006. This year welcomes back schools that were affected by Hurricane Katrina. The issue provides lists sorted by minority groups (African, Asian, Hispanic, Native and International Americans), types of schools: Historic Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) vs. Traditionally White Institutions (TWIs), disciplines by degree level, and a combination of all groups.

Due to the size of the lists, the top 4 quartile (1, 25, 50, 75 & 100) USA schools and Georgia institutions will be shown. The lists are based on total number of minority graduates and the percent change from the last academic year.

APC Field Test

Alabama Power Company (APC) was selected as one of two companies that are part of a field trial for new power failure sensors. Dallas, Texas- based Optisense (www.optisense.net), created sensors that can measure an electric field without actually touching it. This allows utilities to detect and locate a power failure at a faster rate. The sensors operate within voltages of 15kV to 100kV. APC currently uses electro-magnetic devices to monitor voltage.

UPS Adds Hybrid Fleet

United Parcel Service (UPS) has included 50 hybrid electric

vehicles into their fleet of delivery trucks servicing the Atlanta, Dallas, Houston and Phoenix areas. UPS already uses 20,000 low-emission alternate fuel vehicles in throughout the US. The new vehicles are expected to reduce fuel consumption by 44,000 gallons per year and reduce carbon emissions by 457 metric tons. UPS promises to share all data on efficiencies with the US Dept. of Energy.

Energy Efficiency Can Save Florida \$28B & Create Jobs

A recently released study by the American Council for an Energy Efficient Economy (ACEEE) shows that using energy efficiency policies alone (such as efficient windows, compact fluorescent light bulbs, and ENERGY STAR appliances) can nearly offset the state's entire future growth of \$28 Billion in electric demand by the year 2023. Florida would also create more than 14,000 jobs in 2023. The direct and indirect jobs created would be equivalent to nearly 100 new manufacturing plants relocating to Florida, but without the demand for infrastructure and other energy needs, the study says.

The study provides specific energy efficiency and renewable energy policy recommendations that the state should consider, especially as Florida gears up for **Gov. Charlie Crist's** "Serve to Preserve" Summit on Global Climate Change with **California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger** in Miami, FL on July 12 and 13.

Top 10 Ways to Hold Green Meetings

- Establish an environmental policy for the meeting and get buy-in from management.
- 2. Use electronic technology such as email or websites to cut paper use.

The City of Atlanta Chief Operating Officer (COO) **Lynnette W. Young** will step down in August 2007 to head the city's "Future Sustainability" environmental initiative.

New Environmental Laws May Affect GPC Rates

Georgia Power Company (GPC) rates may increase by 12% if new environmental rules are approved. The Georgia Environmental Protection Division (EPD) proposed new Air Quality Rule Amendments that would force GPC to spend \$4B over the next 8 years to install new pollution controls to reduce mercury

emissions. The new rates would increase average residential rates by \$93 per customer. The Georgia Public Service Commission (GPSC) neither supports nor opposes the decision. The rules were filed on June 27th; by law the GPSC must allow GPC to include those costs in its rate base.

Keep Safe in the Sun

Here are some useful tips to help keep you safe in the summer sun.

When the temperature starts to rise, you need to slow down. Regardless of your activity level, drink more fluids; your body needs water to prevent dehydration during warm summer days. Stay away from liquids that contain caffeine, alcohol or large amounts of sugar.

Heat exhaustion develops after dehydration occurs. Those most prone to heat exhaustion include the elderly, those with high blood pressure and children. Symptoms include: cool, moist, pale or flushed skin; muscle cramps; heavy perspiring; nausea and sometimes vomiting; weakness; dizziness; dry mouth; and a headache.

Heat stroke occurs when the body is unable to regulate its temperature and can occur within 10-15 minutes of the first symptoms of heat exhaustion. Signs of heat stroke include: very high body temperature (above 103 degrees); hot, dry, red skin; no sweating; nausea; dizziness; confusion, disorientation or hallucinations; and unconsciousness.

If you feel you are suffering from heat exhaustion, it is important to get out of the sun and into a cool place; loosen clothing, drink water/fluids and be sure to avoid caffeine and alcoholic beverages. Heat stroke is a medical emergency. Have someone call for immediate medical assistance

while you begin cooling the victim. Get the person to a shaded area; cool him/her rapidly, using whatever methods you can. Do not give fluids.

If convulsions occur, keep the victim from injuring himself. Call the hospital emergency room for further instructions if medical assistance is delayed.

Since 1994, the PhD Project has increased the number of minority business professors from 294 to 842 and has 380 minority doctorial students in the pipeline. HISTORY MAKER BIOGRAPHY -

<u>GARRETT A. MORGAN</u> (1877-1963)




Garrett Morgan was an inventor and businessman from Cleveland who invented a device called the Morgan safety hood and smoke protector in 1914. On July 25, 1916, he made national news for using his gas mask to rescue 32 men trapped during an explosion in an underground tunnel 250 feet beneath Lake Erie. Morgan and a team of volunteers donned the new "gas masks" and went to the rescue. After the rescue, Morgan's company received requests from fire departments around the country who wished to purchase the new masks.

The Morgan gas mask was later refined for use by U.S. Army during World War I. In 1914, he was awarded a patent for a Safety Hood and Smoke Protector. Two years later, a refined model of his early gas mask won a gold medal at the International Exposition of Sanitation and Safety, and another gold medal from the International Association of Fire Chiefs.

Garrett Morgan was one of the first to apply for and acquire a U.S. patent for an inexpensive to produce traffic signal device. The patent was granted on November 20, 1923 (see design below). Garrett also had his invention patented in Great Britain and Canada.

Garrett's hand-cranked semaphore traffic management device was in use throughout North America until all manual traffic signals were replaced by the automatic red, yellow, and green-light traffic signals currently used around the world. The inventor sold the rights to his traffic signal to the General Electric Corporation for \$40,000. Shortly before his death in 1963, Garrett was awarded a citation for his traffic signal by the United States Government.

July 25 – 26, 1977 – Clarke Watson forms the American Association of Blacks in Energy at the Watergate Hotel in Washington, DC.

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
